
Status of Mine Ban Treaty Transparency Reporting

Transparency Reporting Rate: 2001-2021







States Parties that have not submitted a transparency report for the past two years or more are indicated in *italics*. **Tuvalu** is the only State Party that has not submitted its initial transparency report (initially due by 28 August 2012).

- State Parties with clearance obligations that have not submitted a transparency report for calendar year 2020.
- State Parties that are retaining mines for research or training that have not submitted a transparency report for calendar year 2020.
- * States Parties with significant numbers of survivors that have not submitted a transparency report for calendar year 2020.



Only 45% of States Parties have submitted their transparency annual reports for calendar year 2020. This is one of the lowest compliance rates ever recorded for the treaty.



There has been a marked decrease in compliance with the transparency reporting obligation since 2004.



Transparency reporting is a treaty obligation (Article 7) and requires that all States Parties provide yearly updates, by 30 April, on steps taken to implement the treaty.
